Hive Irradiation

Massachusetts Beekeepers don't do irradiation anymore. He was able to get a New Jersey place from Mann Lake. Bam is waiting on prices. Will need a 16 foot trailer to deliver them. They need to be picked up a week later. Boxes have to go in a plastic bag and a special cart. If your bees have been dying, you may want to have your boxes irradiated. Leave the frames (even drawn frames) inside the boxes.

Bam mentioned that European Foulbrood is supposed to clear up with food, pollen and sugar water.

Bee Mortality Discussion

Troy Hall has had a lot of bee mortality, widespread from Fairlee to Cornish. He believes it is due to viruses. He said a viral outbreak can spread through the whole bee yard. He did not see deformed wing virus, but you don't always see a deformed wing.

He fed from mid-September to the 2nd week of October and a round of pollen in August.

Troy also stated that robbing doesn't kill bees. It's more of a secondary cause from having a weak hive. He also spoke about mite population and mentioned a study that Randy Oliver did. He wasn't sure if it was conclusive, but you can read about it.

Troy thinks you shouldn't have to treat the bees more than twice a season - or else there's a problem.

David Tarpey said that usually when the bees die, the viruses die.

John Chadwick nominated Betsey McNaughten to be our new vice president.

No February meeting or newsletter due to Bee School.


KBA Membership Directory

Kevin Sargent's Essential Oils Recipes





- 2 Milliliters Of Thyme Oil
- 2 Milliliters Of Spearmint Oil
- 1/2 Milliliters Of Lemongrass Oil

Fall Formula

- 2 Milliliters Of Tea Tree Oil
- 4 Milliliters Of Thyme Oil
- 2 Milliliters Of Wintergreen

These above recipes are for making up 5 gals of sugar syrup to add into the sugar syrup that you will feed to your bees.

Generally feed a minimum of 1 Gal of this essential oil sugar syrup per hive but the more the Qty of this you feed them the better the results.

You need to designate a blender for this only as the smell will stay within the blender/best to buy one for this purpose only. (continued on next page)

In the fall you will notice that the recipe has doubled up on the Thyme dosage as that will give

you a Heavy Varroa mite knock down for winter.

Add about 12 ozs of water to the blender and then add oils and run the blender with cover on

top upon high speed to emulsify for 5 minutes it will look like a milkshake color inside the

blender.

If you can use lecithin granules and a 1/2 teaspoon would be more than enough as that will

keep the oils mixed better with water which may separate in an hour but just shake the

container and pour out what you need for say a 1 gallon batch.

Add water first as if you put straight essential oils into your blender it will eat up the rubber seals

fast. Always rinse blender out at least 3 or more times with hot faucet water and run upon short

cycles to get everything/oil residue removed before storage.

A small eye dropper with Milliliter graduations can be purchased in the beauty section of a store

which should have these.
