OCTOBER 2021 KBA MEETING NOTES

October 9th, 2021 KBA Meeting Notes

Members present at the apiary: Randy (Bam) Fleury, John Chadwick, Bob DeLuca, Jeff Nintzel, Kathy Ordway, Laurie Hardt

Bam called the meeting to order at 9:05.

Treasurer's Report Robin Gray is not in attendance today.

Apiary Report

Committee Chairperson: Shreve Soule

John Chadwick read the apiary report for Shreve Soule who could not attend today.

Shreve, Dana Ramspott and John Chadwick met on October 2nd, 2021. They decided that John would lead the work detail after the meeting on October 9th. The door to the shed will be installed. The bay window will be removed, trim placed under it, and then remounted. A workbench is to be built and mounted on the front wall. Dana will provide adjustable shelving mounts. The second floor boards need to be installed.

They also discussed moving the electric fence to include the shed. Came to the conclusion to leave it as is. We do need to adjust the tension of the wires.

Also discussed all hive equipment in the yard that is not in use.

Committee is looking into having a weed whacker on site. New vs used? No decision was reached.

After the shed is complete, we need to clear out Dana's shed. 10/16?

Committee is looking at purchases of equipment to keep on hand at the apiary. We are waiting to see what the final expenses from building the shed are. The cost of the shed was estimated to be close to \$7000. Due to the generous donations from Durgin and Crowell (Malcolm and Marilyn Milne), Lumber Barn, and LaValleys, the final cost is about \$2000.48.

Harvest Dinner

No one from that committee is in attendance.

Hands On Workshop question

Bob DeLuca had a question about the HOWs. He doesn't have Facebook, and is wondering how he can be notified if a HOWS is cancelled. He asked who makes the decision to cancel, and who puts it on Facebook. He wondered who he could contact before driving over to the apiary.

A discussion about weather and different presenters followed. Sometimes the presenter cancels due to inclement weather. These decisions are usually posted on our Facebook page. The weather is hard to predict and at times these decisions are "last minute."

Also a few times this year, the presenter did not have anyone in attendance at their Hands On Workshop.

We came to the conclusion that next year it would be helpful if the HOWS presenter would include their contact number on the presenter schedule so that they could be contacted prior to the workshop. Also, if one decides to cancel and there is time, an email could be sent out to all members by the secretary. It was also discussed that members may be asked to RSVP to the HOWS they are planning on attending. It would be great for the presenter to know who is planning on attending. Everybody's time is valuable, and all of these workshop leaders VOLUNTEER to do this.

November 20th, 2021 KBA Meeting Notes

This was a short meeting, held prior to Kirk Webster's presentation, primarily to get a Treasurer's report.

At 9:06 Bam called the meeting to order.

Bam said that the advertisements for Bee School 2021 had been approved, but have not been sent out yet. He hopes they will be advertised soon.

Kim Pease was asked about the website. She said she will update the website as soon as possible.

Apiary Report

Shreve Soule stated that Dana's barn had been cleaned out. All items had been put in the shed.

There will be a clipboard to sign out the extractor. It will include a place for your name, phone number, and the estimated date of return.

Anyone who has receipts for items purchased for the shed needs to get the receipts turned in to Robin for reimbursement.

Treasurer's Report

Robin Gray reported that there is presently a \$6,658 balance in the account.

He reported that the Porta-Potty expenditure is \$780 a year (May to October). Also,

approximately \$1800 (so far) has been spent on the shed.

We have 100 current members which is about the same as last year.

He also said that Mary Lloyd-Evans and (her son and daughter-in-law) Peter and Anne Lloyd-Evans, donated \$100 in memory of Peter Zak, a former KBA president from 2008-2010 and member of our club, who passed away recently. Laurie will send thank you cards to both.

KBA Club dues of \$20 per person are due by January 1st. You may also choose a single lifetime membership for a one time cost of \$175 or a family lifetime membership for a one time cost of \$250. The raffle held at last night's Harvest Dinner raised \$183 for the club.

DECEMBER

In the hive

The bees are in their winter cluster, and there is little to no egg laying in December.

Seasonal conditions

In Ithaca, NY, in December, the average minimum and maximum temperatures are 22°F and 36°F, with 13" of snow and 2" of other precipitation. The shortest day of the year is December 21, although the earliest sunset is on December 8 at 4:32pm.

Nothing is in bloom, except perhaps some varieties of witch hazel.

Beekeeping activities

Equipment

- Order any replacement bees (packages, nucs, or queens) as soon as possible; producers generally run out fast.
- Clean your honey house, freezer, or other areas that are chaotic/full in the active season.
- Take inventory. Fix, clean/sterilize, purchase, assemble, and paint equipment as needed.

Yard maintenance

• Remove ice blocking the hive entrances, to give the colonies better ventilation. Don't worry about snow around the entrance or hive body; it allows enough airflow and may help insulate the bees.

Education and outreach

- Spend this time reflecting on what went well and what you might change next year. Plan for your upcoming
 year: do you want to downsize or scale up, try out a new form of honey production, get into the pollination
 business, or something else?
