PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Another month has flown by, we spend all winter thinking about the upcoming season and then all of a sudden, it's here!

The weather continues to be challenging or a pain in the Bee-hind. The hard frost managed to kill what blooms were on my peach tree. I think my apple trees might produce a few apples as the blossoms came out after the frost, and the bees were working on them.

I spent a few days with Bam Fleury driving to and back from Baxley Georgia for bee packages. The trip is always a nice distraction from work. We had great weather on the way down and back. It's about a 20-24 hour trip one way. I think South Carolina had the cheapest gas prices at \$3.03. Yes, I had some grits. Gotta have them grits & biscuits when in the south!

I have one hive that overwintered and has been struggling. I should have been feeding them but instead, I would throw a frame of capped brood with a little nectar from another hive in and let them continue to struggle. I hate spending money on sugar. The queen is laying a good pattern but the brood weren't swimming in jelly and last year's capped honey was depleted. I have fed them a gallon of 1: 1 syrup and they are back on track looking good. The hive had 3 frames of capped brood and 5 of various stages. The queen is really making the rounds! All my other hives were doing great, bringing in fresh nectar and almost getting pollen bound. 3 of my queens are on their third season. Still laying very well.

An email will be sent out looking for a head count for our July Cookout. Please try to respond if you are planning on attending. One of our members (John Downing) has graciously donated the hotdogs and hamburgers for the cookout. Thank you John!

Check out the HOWS schedule. I try to go to as many as possible. I'm in my 13th year of beekeeping in NH and always come away feeling invigorated because I learned, or was reminded of an essential skill. After Kevin Sargents HOWS on queen rearing, I find myself motivated in raising my own queens and just how easy it can be. I usually wait for the swarm cells to make splits but this year I plan to use specific queens that are on their 3rd season of service to the hive.



Kim Pease is working on finishing her Master Beekeeper certification. She needs our mite washed dead bees for her study. I hope you will support her in her efforts. Contact Kim for more information.

Festooning bees: lacework between the frames

Festooning is a mysterious honey bee behavior. You most often see festoons during comb-building season in early spring. A lacework of bees hanging together, leg-to-leg, between the frames of comb is called a "festoon" and the behavior is called "festooning." The bees hang in lace-like sheets between the frames. Sometimes the pattern is as wide and as deep as the frame itself, but often it is smaller.

What's in Bloom in June?

Lots of blooms continue: deadnettle, black locust, tulip poplar, hawthorn, autumn olive, willow, dandelion, oak, apple, cherry, plum, honeysuckle, pear, elderberry, blueberries, raspberries, blackberries, and the earlier clovers- plus white sweetclover (Melilotus alba) and yellow sweetclover (Melilotus officinalis). Basswood/linden (Tilia spp.) may bloom by the end of the month. The european species, littleleaf linden, can usually be found in parks and urban areas. It blooms slightly earlier than the American basswood (July), which is generally found in the wild. Other blooms include catalpa trees (Catalpa speciosa), milkweed (Asclepias spp.), yellow rocket (Barbarea spp.), birdsfoot trefoil (Lotus corniculatus), hairy and purple vetch (Vicia villosa, Vicia americana), chicory (Cichorium intybus), grape (Vitis spp.), and

sumac (Rhus spp.). These also include invasives such as purple loosestrife (Lythrum salicaria), knapweed (Centaurea spp.), and Russian olive (Elaeagnus angustifolia). Alfalfa (Medicago sativa) may also be in bloom, although it is generally cut for hay before it flowers.


