PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Hello,

I hope everyone is doing well. Flu and cold season is upon us, hopefully you have plenty of honey for your cough or sore throat. When I was sick and had bronchitis as a young child, my mom would make a homemade remedy. I recall only having this maybe 2 or 3 times growing up. She would warm some whiskey & honey and let me sip on it in the middle of the night. I wasn't a big whiskey fan at age 6. It seemed to do the trick letting me sleep and rest up. My country Doctor would still make a home visit then. Funny thing is I never thought to use that with my kids when they were sick and up during the night. Too many over the counter remedies I guess. As I write this we are having a warm spell. Sounds like some winter weather might arrive next week. Most of my hives are up to weight. Those that are not, which is 1 or 2, are on their own until springtime checks. It's a good time to put your mouse guards on if you haven't done so. I did OA vaporization yesterday. As expected, I did a few mite washes and found mite levels were higher than I like. 18 mites per 300 bees. See Randy Oliver's webpage on mite levels. (How to use the XXX mite wash cup - Scientific Beekeeping,) I didn't do an early August treatment this year so I was expecting high counts. I guess what really was going on was my early August mite counts were below treatment levels unlike most years. Most hives had 3-0 mites per 300 bees. Am I experimenting? Can I get away with using OA vaporization in the Spring and Fall only? Deep down, I would love to maintain my hives without treatment. I grew up around hives in that time when treatment wasn't needed. I will try not to whine too much when spring comes around! To quote the late great Tom Petty, "the waiting is the hardest part."

Like every subject, beekeepers have different opinions on how to overwinter a hive. I have been changing up my routine but feel I am now keeping more to a similar routine every winter. Until I read another interesting article that stirs my beekeeper imagination!

I'm getting excited for the Harvest dinner 11/10 Friday evening, and guest speaker Dr Zac Lamas the following Saturday morning on 11/11 at the first baptist church in North Sutton.
