#### PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Hello! Happy Summer Solstice! This season is flying by and it has not been one of my better years for swarm management. I do have a doctor's note to excuse me for the season. 9

I am just getting to the point where I can work a few of my hives again on my own. Of course one of my hives that swarmed has yet to requeen. You wouldn't know they swarmed by the population of the hive. They are quite defensive at this point. It is not a pleasant task when I take 5-10 stings through my bee suit and have yet to start pulling frames for the inspection. Smoke helps but this hive followed me around the property for a while. Pretty sure that same hive sends a welcoming committee to greet me as I sit outside drinking my coffee. My wife got stung just under her eye while cleaning our car. The good news is I found a new queen in the hive yesterday and she is looking like she is expanding and getting ready to start laying. Hopefully the drones she mated with had some gentle genetics.

Milkweed is in full bloom around my neighborhood. It can be fun to watch the bees land back at the hive. Milkweed blooms have some very sticky parts and sometimes the bees come back to the hive with parts of the flower still attached to them! You will see some of the entry guards wrestling with the returning field bee to remove the attached item. For the first time I observed my bees working Winterberry (Ilex verticillata): Native to swampy habitats in the Eastern United States. The bushes were loaded with little white blooms and most years I never noticed them on the blooms. Walking up the road I could hear the gentle hum of happy bees working the flowers.

As we near the end of the nectar flow, it's time to start to focus on mite control and what treatment options are best for you and your bees. Start with a mite wash and see if treatment is necessary. You will want to monitor mite counts for the next few months closely as our hive populations begin to decline in preparation for, dare I say it, Winter.

I would invite you to visit Randy Oliver's Scientific Beekeeping webpage. He covers in great detail, testing and treating for mites. <u>Mite Monitoring Methods Archives - Scientific Beekeeping</u>

The Dearth- it's not a rock band, but it is coming to a bee yard near you! Generally by mid-July, the majority of nectar producing plants have stopped production. This is when a hive can begin to starve out. Too many mouths to feed and not enough nectar coming in to maintain the stores. Sometimes the beekeeper contributes to starvation by harvesting too much honey and not realizing the error. Watch for the early signs. Check out Rusty Burlew's blog for more information.
