Last Meeting Follow-up

Secretary's Report (Diane Mancino): 85 Renewal notices and 156 expired membership notices were sent out March 13, resulting in 11 renewals.

A Members only ZOOM event was a success on March 20, 7pm, 7 members dropped in and we discussed how our hives fared over the winter, and gave advice on how to prepare for new packages, and availability of local delivery.

HOWS schedule sent out. Shreve created a HOWS schedule and that was sent out to our members. This will be updated as needed,

I want to remind our beekeeping members that our emails are only sent to current members. That includes lifetime, current 2025, and 2024 members who need to update their \$20 membership dues.

Treasurer's Report (Robin Gray): KBA account balance \$8986, Membership payments 51. We have 83 paid members. Bee School registrations 32, 3 \$75 gift cards for Bee school was approved

Apiary Report (Shreve Soule): The first HOWS will be on March 29th, on dead outs and assess what survived from last year and clean up and prep the hives for the new packages that will be coming if we need them. We will also have a schedule through the year.

We're going to have a sign up for the different HOWS and various subjects, everything will be covered from dead outs to the winterizing and feeding for winter. Probably be a little more in depth for the new beekeepers than bee school, and we tend to repeat things at each HOWs, "so that if you can't make one HOWS, it's all right to ask a question at the next. We don't mind at all. And we get some lively discussions with the members who have been doing this a long time. It's actually a lot of fun". Will the schedule be posted? Yes- in case of really bad

weather, it may go to the next weekend, or sometimes we'll go the following Sunday. We will also post the event on the KBA Facebook page and our KBA website.

The KBA Apiary in Sunapee is for everybody. There are things that new members can help out with, such as cutting the grass, trimming grass around the bear fence, inspecting the electric fence, feeding bees, we need somebody to come up during the week. So there's a lot of things that we can get involved with. You don't have to see an expert beekeeper to do a lot of this stuff. It was suggested that the lawnmower be upgraded or repaired. Kevin Sargent offered to bring a better one.

Note: There is a box of Beekeeping books at the apiary shed. We will look at them at the next meeting and decide what to do with them. Probably a donation dropped off. We are not accepting old equipment at the apiary.

THANK YOU, Laurel Bride and her husband made the sugar syrup, gallons and gallons, walked it up there, fed everybody, eight to 10, sometimes 13 hives, and she did it for an entire month!

Bee School (Bob Deluca): We had a very successful Bee School. 32 registrations, one scholarship. This is the first time we had a scholarship. The Bee school brought in about \$3,000. We would like to thank all of the committee members for all their hard work in getting this all together this year. And I'd also like to thank all the representatives for their presentations, and also to Deb Stevens in the school for the facility. It was just fantastic. It was a great place to have the Bee School. The raffle was successful. \$615 from raffle tickets. Betsey McNaughten did a great job with that. Thank you Betsey! It was a really good idea, so hope we keep it going for the next year.

Should Bee School have their own budget/account? We normally have like a \$500 budget a year for Bee school. It was suggested that Bob, Robin, John and the Bee School committee should get together two months from now, figure out what they spent, and then bring it to a meeting maybe September, August, and report this is what we spent, this is what we want for the budget. Discussion Tabled.

Nominating Committee (John Chadwick): nothing to report

Educational Outreach (Amelia Lantz): We have an invite to go to Plainfield libraries in May.

Website (Joey Byrnes): KBA website, weeks one through four of 2025 Bee school presentations have been added to the archives page. John is working on editing for the final class, and I will post it when I receive it. We will update the events page as soon as possible, so I will wait for the location for the next meeting, and the HOWS schedule when they are available.

Scholarship Committee: KBA awarded its very first Bee School scholarship this year to Lucia Franta, a senior and high school who wrote a beautiful essay about her aspirations to pursue the field of Sustainable Ag after graduation, recognizing that beekeeping is an integral part of her goal.

Speaker Committee: Susan Menard was working on trying to maybe get Janice from White Mountain Apiary to be a speaker, probably in April. But nothing's been firmed up at this point.

NHBA had their meeting on February 13th. Musterfield Farm's Farm Day is August 23rd and 24th. When we go to Musterfield Farm for a farm day, we sell a lot of honey. We didn't have any leftover for harvest day. So, Bill Gogan brought his son and sold. We totally sold out this year. Anybody that wants to come and sit at the table.

Farm and Forest is going to be May 2 and May 3. The New Hampshire Beekeeper Association moved their booth to the second building next to the 4H demo areas this year, which is different from where they've been previously. This is a higher traffic area.

New Hampshire Beekeepers fall meeting, Monadnock Beekeepers will be hosting it this year. It looks like they are looking at the first week of November to do this due to a conflict with the end of October for them. Date has not been set, but it looks like they're looking at the first week, the first Saturday in Novem-

ber, but that's TBD. November 8 is our harvest supper and speaker the next day, so let's hope it's not concurrent.

KBA Bylaws: During the March meeting, a motion was made to accept the updated bylaws, which were read at the club's January meeting. Motion passed. No abstentions. No votes against. Again, a huge thank you to Cathy Chelsey for all her work on updating these bylaws.

Beekeeper Relief Fund (Mike Plunkett): We've been working with the Fells in Newbury NH. We will have our own fundraiser event, the Newberry Honeybee and Flower festival. The Fells has indicated they're willing to as long as we do all the organizing, we can also have some vendors there. The date is not set. They said three to five vendors and I'd like to offer the first table to our local Bee club. So if the KBA is interested in having an outreach table or a demonstration or an observation hive, we're open for it to be a one day all day event with a speaker every hour on the hour. One speaker would speak on bees, the other speaker on flowers. The next one would talk about pollenating and so go back and forth. We don't know when because the people we met with have to take what they learned to their board of directors, have a meeting, and figure out how they're going to schedule this. Their schedules are almost all booked. They might be talking about something as close to October as possible. So there isn't a date set, we're going to find out how many tables they're going to let us have and I'd like to offer the first table to the KBA for the local Bee club to be represented there.

The April KBA meeting location needs to be decided, the Warner Town hall is not available. So we have the option of either going to Sutton fire department or we could do a virtual meeting for April, motion on the floor to do it at the Sutton Fire Department was approved


